
#### WAKE DOWNTOWN




### BUILDING THE DREAM AWARD WINNERS

## OFFICE OF INSTITUTIONAL RESEARCH

Faculty Survey Tuesday, January 24, 2017

On Tuesday, January 24, 2017, our Office of Institutional Research will administer (online) the 2016-2017 HERI Faculty Survey to all of Wake Forest's full-time faculty, librarians with faculty status, and teaching administrators on the Reynolda Campus.

This national survey, conducted by the Higher Education Research Institute (HERI) at UCLA, provides a valuable set of responses from faculty by school. The survey is administered every three years; we have participated since 1998. Results for Wake Forest and "All Private Universities" from the 2013-2014 HERI survey can be accessed here.

The HERI Faculty Survey gives us actionable information on important and timely issues. It includes topics such as pedagogical practices, faculty goals and expectations for students, research and service activities, sources of stress and satisfaction, and the connection between learning in the classroom and practices in the local and global community.

We have used the results from the HERI Faculty Survey in strategic planning, faculty recruitment and retention, faculty development activities, assessment and accreditation, and discussions relating pedagogy to student learning experiences. Also as in past years, we include guestions specific to Wake Forest. Once the results are compiled, we will be able to compare our results with those of peer institutions.



This piece was inspired in part by the unjust killing of Trayvon Martin and is a prismatic exploration of the history and violence directed at African Americans from the Colonial Era to the present, originally premiering at the University of Maryland in 2014.

The performances will take place February 10th-11th, 16th-18th at 7:30pm and February 12th and 19th at 2pm on the Tedford Stage in Scales Fine Arts Center. If you have an advisee looking for course openings, show them the Open Course Report on the Office of Academic Advising's website. This is an easy-to-read listing of Spring courses with open seats, updated weekly through the add period.

#### Advisers of Seniors Intending to Graduate: Please review DegreeWorks NOW!

Check DegreeWorks on behalf of each graduating senior you advise. The requirement block and individual course requirement should have a green check mark beside them or a single squiggly line (if they are currently enrolled in the course requirement). If any of your students have unmet requirements (empty red check boxes), please reach out to them immediately, because THEIR MAY GRADUATION MAY BE IN JEOPARDY. (Students may participate in commencement if they have 112 hours and a 2.0 GPA overall and in their major(s), but they must apply to participate through the Registrar's office.)



You can help them discern if they need to add a class, drop a minor, follow through on transfer credit

that has not been applied, correct an error on DegreeWorks, apply to participate in commencement while making a plan to complete remaining requirements, or otherwise resolve the discrepancy.

#### **Student Adviser Nominations**

We will use this recommendation in recruiting and interviewing student adviser candidates for the 2017 fall semester. Please be aware that this recommendation does not guarantee the student a position as a student adviser. He/she must apply, interview, and be selected for the position. We hope that by increasing the pool of recommended candidates for student advising all lower-division advisers will be paired with highly competent and effective student advisers.

#### **Academic Alerts**

Faculty and advisers can alert the Office of Academic Advising to any "red flags" about student performance or well-being by using the academic alert form. The link to this form is on our OAA web page. Common "red flags" for student difficulty are poor classroom attendance, poor performance on early quizzes or papers, or significant changes in appearance or behaviors. If you have any students or advisees who are displaying such behaviors, you are of course encouraged to talk directly to the student. However, if you feel uncomfortable addressing the student directly, have not had success in getting a response from a student, or wish to have support in helping a student, we hope you will contact us. The earlier we can intervene together to address problems, the better chance we have of helping students correct them before the consequences become too great. ## DAN LOCKLAIR'S PHOENIX FOR ORCHESTRA


Performed by the Memphis Symphony, Saturday, January 14, 2017

## TECH TIP: ANTICIPATING A WHITE HOUSE APPOINTMENT? CONSIDER OUR PILOT OF ANTI-PLAGIARISM SOFTWARE

This tech tip comes from Instructional Technologist <u>Steven Wicker</u>. We are now in phase two of our pilot of a cloud-based tool for assessing originality of student work. This service is called VeriCite. VeriCite is integrated into Sakai and is only available within the Assignments tool. During phase one of the pilot a series of workshops, <u>Building a Student Culture of Academic Integrity: The Role of Anti-Plagiarism Software</u>, were offered. The Learning Management System Team will be sending out a survey at the end of the semester to evaluate this service.
