ABOUT THE SPEAKERS

KEVIN JUNG works in the field of religious ethics with a particular focus in moral theory. His current research interests include virtue epistemology, neuroethics, and the rationality of religious beliefs. He is the author of *Ethical Theory and Responsibility Ethics and Moral Realism* (Peter Lang, 2011) and *Moral Realism and Christian Ethics* (book manuscript), and co-editor of *Humanity Before God: Contemporary Faces of Jewish, Christian, and Islamic Ethics* (Fortress Press, 2006), and *Doing Justice to Mercy: Religion, Law, and Criminal Justice* (University of Virginia Press, 2007). He also translated Gene Outka's *Agape: An Ethical Analysis* and John Witte's *From Sacrament to Contract: Marriage and Law in Western Tradition* into Korean, both published by the Christian Literature Society of Korea.

VERONICE MILES teaches preaching and womanist thought. Miles earned a Ph.D in religious education and homiletics from Emory University in 2009. Her dissertation, "Towards a Pedagogy of Hope: A Womanist Christian Education and Homiletics Approach to Catalyzing Hope in the Lives of Young Black Women," explores how people might learn to live with hope when circumstances suggest that the world of suffering and oppression is that which is most common to their lives. An ordained Baptist minister, Miles's experience in the academy is augmented by her ministry with local church communities and religious organizations. She has preached and taught extensively, and has presented papers and workshops for numerous academic and church conferences, meetings, and organizations.

STUDENT AWARDS

The Christian Education Award recognizes a graduating senior who has demonstrated through coursework and internships a commitment to Christian education and educational ministries.

The Jerry M. Crainshaw Preaching Award was established by the Crainshaw family in memory of Jerry M. Crainshaw, a strong supporter of the art of preaching. It is for members of the graduating class of the Wake Forest University School of Divinity. Recipients must be outstanding preachers, as determined by the faculty of the School of Divinity.

The John Thomas and Dorothy Porter Award in Vocational Formation and Community Ministry is presented to two graduating seniors who have demonstrated significant commitment to ministry in the broad context of Christian ministry. The Reverend Dr. John Thomas Porter was pastor of the Sixth Avenue Baptist Church, Birmingham, for 38 years. One of America's leading civil rights advocates, Porter was one of the first African Americans elected to the Alabama legislature in the civil rights era. Dorothy Porter is an outstanding musician and soloist, widely known throughout the United States.

The Biblical Languages Award is given to the graduating senior who has demonstrated significant ability in the study of biblical languages. It is presented on recommendation of the faculty.

Spirituality and the Arts Award honors the understanding and active engagement of a student in spirituality and the arts.

The Ashley and Whitney Walker Award is named for the daughters of Dale Walker ('65) and is given to students who demonstrate academic excellence, initiative in ministerial pursuits, and particular concern for woman-centered topics from a theological perspective.

Academic Achievement Awards are given to the three students in the graduating class who have the highest cumulative grade point averages.

The Margaret Woodford Guthrie Prize is a graduation award established by Wiley C. Guthrie ('52) in memory of his wife. It is for members of the graduating class of the School of Divinity. Recipients must have a superior scholarship record, a personality suited to the requirements of Christian ministry, and have effectively participated in the school's activities.

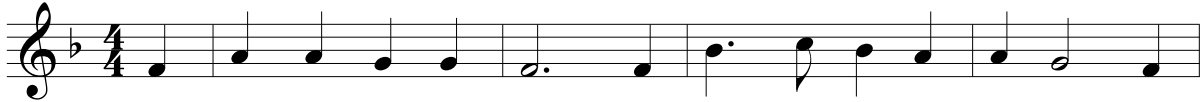
